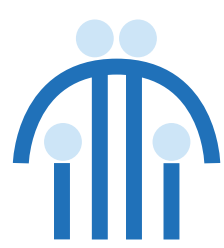

# What Queenslanders Really Think About ABORTION

A report on a comprehensive independent market research survey conducted by Galaxy Research, commissioned by the Australian Family Association.

This randomised telephone opinion poll of 400 Queensland voters was conducted from 15 to 17 October 2010, with 13 questions in total.

# Methodology

- ▶ This study was conducted by Galaxy Research between Friday 15 October and Sunday 17 October 2010.
- ▶ The telephone survey was conducted among 400 people aged eighteen years and over, living in Queensland, who are eligible to vote at elections. The sample was stratified by age and gender within area.
  - Brisbane 200
  - Rest of Queensland 200
- ▶ Interviews were conducted using CATI (computer assisted telephone interviewing) with telephone numbers randomly selected from electronic White Pages. All interviewers were personally trained and briefed on the requirements of the study.
- ▶ Following the completion of interviewing, the data was weighted by age, gender and region to reflect the latest ABS population estimates.



# Main Findings

## Definition of human life

- ▶ Queenslanders are split on whether abortion involves taking human life with half (50%) saying yes it does involve the taking of human life, 42% saying 'no' and 7% 'Don't know'. The view that abortion involves taking a human life is slightly more likely to be held by females (55% compared to 45% among males) and among those with less than Year 12 education (58% compared to 47% among those with Year 12 or higher education).
- ▶ Six in ten Queenslanders (61%) believe that an unborn child at 20 weeks of pregnancy is a human person with human rights. This view is more likely among females (67%), the 35-49 year age group (68%) or lower income households (68%).

## Circumstances that may support abortion

- ▶ Less than half (46%) of Queenslanders support abortion for non-medical reasons, that is, for financial and social reasons, and half (49%) do *not* support abortion for non-medical reasons. Only 4% of people are undecided.
- ▶ More than one in four (29%) of Queenslanders overall would not allow abortion at any stage of pregnancy. A further 45% would only allow abortion if it is conducted with the first three months, totalling 74% who favour *not* allowing abortion after three months (or not at all).
- ▶ A further 14% would allow abortion up to 20 weeks (half way through pregnancy), and 7% would allow abortion at any time during pregnancy.



## Main Findings.... continued

### Decisionmaking

- ▶ Almost everyone (94%) believes that a woman should receive free independent counselling and information so that she can make a fully informed decision.
- ▶ Nine in ten (88%) Queenslanders believe that there should be a cooling off period of several days between making an appointment for an abortion and the actual operation. This view is held broadly across age and gender demographics.
- ▶ Nine in ten (86%) Queenslanders believe that parental consent should normally be required for girls under the age of sixteen to have an abortion.
- ▶ Three in four (77%) of Queenslanders believe that abortion can harm the mental and physical health of a woman (84% of 18-34 year olds believe this as do 86% of 35-49 year olds).
- ▶ Nine in ten (86%) Queenslanders support conscientious objection provisions allowing doctors and nurses to opt out of having to perform abortion operations against their will.



## Main Findings..... continued

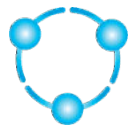
### Legal aspects

- ▶ Half (49%) of Queenslanders believe that the current law on abortion in Queensland is 'About right' (40%) or 'Not restrictive enough' (9%). Almost half (47%) believe that the law is 'Too restrictive', and only 4% 'Don't know'.
- ▶ Queenslanders are split on whether abortion should be decriminalised with half (50%) saying that it should *not* be decriminalised and half (48%) saying yes it should be decriminalised. Among the 18-34 year age group 60% say that abortion should *not* be decriminalised.

### Influence on voting behaviour

- ▶ If their local member of parliament voted in favour of decriminalising abortion, 42% say that it would influence the way they vote in the next state election, and 55% say that it would not influence the way they vote. More than half (57%) of the 18-34 age group say that it *would* influence the way they vote at the next state elections. It appears that younger Queenslanders feel more strongly on the issue of decriminalising abortion.
- ▶ Among those who would be influenced if their member of parliament voted in favour of decriminalising abortion, two thirds (63%) would be *less likely* to vote for their member of parliament. This view is broadly held across age groups and is slightly more widely held among females (67%) and among regional Queensland voters (66%). This means that 26% of Queenslanders would be less likely to vote for their MP if he or she voted for decriminalisation, compared with 14% who would be more likely to vote for their MP in that case.
